Today we can fabricate anything, yet there is a discrepancy between the wonder of digital fabrication technology and the conventionalism of our designs. We need a new type of design instrument. We need tools for search and exploration, rather than simply control and execution. Knowledge and experience will be acquired through searching and mining. We have countless tools to increase our efficiency and precision. Now is the time to create tools to inspire creativity.

Michael Hansmeyer is an architect and programmer. Recent projects include the Sixth Order installation of columns at the Gwangju Design Biennale, and the design and fabrication of a 3D-printed grotto for an Archilab exhibition. He is currently a visiting professor at the Academy of Fine Arts in Vienna.

**Are We Human? Design after Design

For this event, the curators, exhibition architect and London-based participants in the Third Istanbul Design Biennial engage its central theme: 'Are We Human? The Design of the Species. 200,000 years, 200 years, two years, two seconds'.

Design always presents itself as serving the human, but its real ambition is to redesign the human. To talk about design is to talk about the state of our species. Humans have always been radically reshaped by the designs they produce, and the world of design keeps expanding. We live in a time when everything is designed, from our carefully crafted individual looks and online identities, to the surrounding galaxies of personal devices, new materials, interfaces, networks, systems, infrastructures, data, chemicals, organisms, and genetic codes. Even the planet itself has been completely encrusted by design as a geological layer. There is no longer an outside to the world of design; design has become the world. The default concept of 'good design' that was incubated in London in the mid-nineteenth century is no longer adequate. It is an anaesthetic that has worn off. The urgent question is: what is design after design?

Modern Forms

**A Subjective Atlas of
Twentieth-Century Architecture
Nicolas Gropierre**

AA Gallery

At once a reference work and a personal exploration of modernist architecture, this collection of photographs by Nicolas Gropierre covers structures built between 1920 and 1989 in Europe, North and South America, the Middle East and Asia. Derived from his popular blog, A Subjective Atlas of Modern Architecture, the images represent Gropierre's on-going project to record a range of buildings, from the iconic Gateway Arch in Saint Louis and the Ukrainian Institute of Scientific Research and Development in Kiev, to little-known structures like the Balneological Hospital in Druskininkai, Lithuania, and Oscar Niemeyer's unfinished International Fair Grounds in Tripoli.

The exhibition presents modernist architecture as the embodiment of political and social ideologies, particularly in its use by institutions such as banks, churches, libraries and government buildings. While many of the buildings in this archive often go unrecognised, their forms are prominent in the landscape of modern civilisation. Here images are organised by architectural form only. An accompanying index details the location, date, architect and purpose of each building. Gropierre's keen eye and enthusiasm for both the mundane and the sublime will challenge viewers to look at the buildings around them and classify them in new ways.

Nicolas Gropierre was awarded the Golden Lion at the 2008 Venice Architecture Biennale for his joint exhibition with Kobas Laksa in the Polish Pavilion. His photographs are shown in major cities around the world.

Paradise Lost

Paradise Lost concludes a four-year examination of the concept of architectural obsolescence, pursued through an exploration of the contemporary United States. While the US was the world's greatest economic, scientific and cultural force during the twentieth century, it now faces a kind of unplanned obsolescence, in which the nation has become progressively obsessed with its own decline. In these circumstances, changing patterns of consumption and demand have often resulted in an architectural redundancy, in which architecture simply exists as a kind of by-product or residue of these processes.

The exhibition and accompanying publication provide a visual documentation of these architectural remainders. Captured at first with the careless haste of a tourist, these photographs were later recorded with greater care, in an attempt to explore a scattered and provisional history of American architecture shaped by patterns of political and economic upheaval, a history that is expressive of those contradictions which are clearest in the most banal, least continuous and anonymous of all architectures: those possessed solely by time.

This exhibition charts the photographic exploration of architecture, open spaces and interiors by six artists from the Baltic States and Russia. Encompassing intimate Polaroid photographs by filmmaker Andrey Tarkovsky, to technical architectural surveys by St Petersburg photographer Vladimir Antoshenkov and conceptual work by Gintautas Trimakas, it reveals a range of artistic photographic practices in Eastern Europe from the 1970s to now.

The Collective

The Collective project is dedicated to exploring artistic expression in the Architectural Association. It is essentially a monument that allows members of the student community to share work produced outside of their unit studios. These expressions can be presented in any form – film,

photography, painting, collage or models – and can be completely unrelated to architecture. Work is submitted through a competition and selected by the project committee initiated by AA student Mona Haidar. The exhibition site is an adjustable plinth, which can be manipulated to accommodate different methods of display. The Collective aims to trigger conversation and build an alternative portfolio of AA culture.
